#### Principal, Nine Teachers To Leave High School

At the beginning of each year WHS welcomes newcomers to the faculty, but as the year passes, it is inevitable that some of our faculty should leave. This year we bid farewell to nine teachers and an administrator who have paved the way for better education.

Highly regarded for his maintenance of orderliness and discipline, Mr. Hinterberg, who has served WHS well as principal for the past 34 years, is retiring. Mr. Hinterberg plans to spend much of his time working on his farmland. Last April he was elected to the City Council; thus his schedule next year should be quite full

Mrs. Reinhard, who teaches seventh, eighth, and senior art is also re-tiring. She is the advisor of the Crafts Club.

A commercial teacher, Mr. Wills, is retiring this year. A member of the faculty for the past 38 years, Mr. Wills is going into accounting next year. He advises the Service Club.

#### Scribbler Staff Chosen; S. Mears Named Editor





#### Pat Zeimis Heads Orbit; '59 Edition Underway


Although 1958 Orbits have not yet made their appearance in WHS halls, work on the 1959 edition has already commenced under the direction of the newly selected staff of juniors.

## Mystery Author

(The well-known mystery author of the last issue was Robert Louis Stevenson).

Born in "Merry old England" this famous author led a very harrowing life. He had been born Feb. 17, 1812, the second in a family of eight children. His father was a clerk who never seemed to have enough money to support his family. Thus, they drifted from one shabby home to another.

This author, who was twelve at the time, got a job in a blacking warehouse. He worked twelve hours a day, six days a week, putting labels on bottles of blackening.

Then very unexpectedly his father received a legacy. He happily quit his job and was sent to a private school. But, once more his father lost his money foolishly and, after two years the son had to quit school. He taught himself shorthand in order to get a job. He got a job as a court reporter and later advanced to the reporters' gallery of the House of Commons. But, as he once said, "reporting is echoing what other people have said," and he wanted to see his own words in print. He sent a sketch to a publisher and was so happy when it was accepted, he wept. This was it was accepted, he wept. the beginning of a new and prosper-

ous career for him. Soon his fame spread to America. In England he continued to write. He founded a newspaper, a weekly journal and a magazine. Several of his famous books appeared in serial form in his magazine. It was during this time that he published A Tale of Two Cities and David Copperfield. Most of you by this time should be aware of this famous author. His name—Charles Dickens.



If you're still with me here at the bottom of the column, I would like to wish you a pleasant summer vacation. Look for this column next year. It can't get any worse than it is now.


#### Golfers Finish Well



Watertown Goslings failed in their attempt to retain the track championship of the conference in their annual track meet at Port Washington. They also failed to register any first places, although Mike Podolske and Dave Pirkel managed to take two seconds apiece. Mike won his points placing in the broad jump and the 220-yard dash, while Dave compiled his in the low and high hurdles. Pete Westermeyer placed third in the high jump, accompanied by Frank Schmitt's third in the shot put. Three fifths were won by the Goslings as Don Krueger took a fifth in the low hurdles, Ken Schwantes in the 440yard dash, and the fifth racked up by John Wright, Tom Podolske, Ronnie Strege, and Pat Loughlin.

The varsity was defeated 77-41, while the "B's" were dumped by an almost identical score of 78-40. Several fine efforts on the part of some of the Goslings brightened the otherwise dismal meet. Mike Podolske defeated two formidable foes to win the 100-yard dash in a fast :10.5, and the 220-yard dash in a respectable :22.8. He also won the broad jump to sustain his winning ways. Dave Pirkel finished the meet with a victory in the low hurdles and a second in the highs won by Cooney.
