
School activities unite the elements of the road.



Social Science is very important in our modern world. World History helps us understand our fellow man and his problems.




In the library students have every opportunity they need to deepen their knowledge and increase their appreciation for good reading.

Languages are cultural, yet practical subjects. Latin is a basis for the study of other languages and many occupational fields.




